Course Description High School Bible I

Philosophy Statement: The study of God's Word provides a strong foundational discipline in the life of a Christian. By studying the Bible, students and staff can gain knowledge, understanding, and a clear application of their lives. By training students early in their lives, the Bible will become an essential tool for students as they mature throughout their lives. By memorizing Scripture, students will have it ingrained into their minds; so when trials and temptations come, they will have the wisdom from God in their minds and in their hearts.
